Advocacy Chairs collaborate with others to provide input, share feedback, and gather information to drive initiatives in support of second-language education.

Their work inspires action and empowers organizations, stakeholders, and educators to shape a brighter future for second-language learners.

Responsibilities of the Advocacy Chair

A strong Advocacy Chair ensures language advocacy remains a core focus. Responsibilities may include:

- Participate in Language Advocacy Days (or ensure a representative attends).
- Attend Legislative Updates to stay informed about critical policies.
- Disseminate advocacy information to members and stakeholders.
- Integrate advocacy into organizational activities, such as:
 - Hosting a dedicated block of time during the general assembly to share updates, resources, and strategies
 - Leading conference sessions on advocacy-related topics.
 - Providing an exhibitor table with advocacy materials and resources.
 - Creating an advocacy newsletter or contributing a regular column in the organization's newsletter.
